Pastor Peter's message notes from Nov. 22, 2020

Rich Church, Poor Church: Transformation

The scriptures of the Old and New Testament make it clear the aim of faith is to transform us from following sin to following Jesus. Paul was transformed on the road to Damascus when he encountered Jesus in a flash of light. He went on to live a life of transformation, challenging us in Romans Chapter 12 to dedicate our whole lives to God so that we might discern the will of God and be transformed by the grace of Jesus Christ. This is why we exist as church: so that through the power of God, others might have new life in Christ.

In the Rich Church we hear how transformation is taking place. People testify about how they were once lost through things like drugs or alcohol or workaholism and how the church led them to understand the transforming nature of Christ. The congregation sees how their gifts help people do mission work in the Third World, feed the hungry, bring new people to faith, and support families who are financially struggling during the pandemic. In the Rich Church, people are encouraged to give to help continue this transformation.

The Message translation of Romans 12:2 reads, "Don't become so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out."

When people give and then see the transformation, they are immediately compelled to want to give again and to give more to make an even bigger difference. It is a beautiful cycle. Don't all of us want to make a difference? Don't we want our communities to look like the kingdom of heaven on earth?

The Rich Church is well aware that giving is a spiritual discipline and a spiritual decision. It has little to do with money, but it has everything to do with our devotion to Christ as Lord of our life. It is easy to fool ourselves into believing we have a good relationship with our Savior until we are put to the test of giving and then forced to see what we truly trust.

I haven't tithed my whole adult life. When I went to college and for several years afterwards, I drifted away from Jesus' mission to change the world. I wasn't giving financially to Jesus' mission. I now wonder how tithing would have changed my life in my early twenties. Would I have drifted away from the community of faith if I had understood how God could use me and my gifts to change the lives of others? Could God have changed my life through the spiritual practice of giving?

When people invited me to return to the life of faith, I remember seeing how the church was changing lives for God: raising the next generation in faith, feeding the hungry and visiting the sick. They offered hope to me. I wanted to make a contribution to this important work and felt compelled to start giving financially to Jesus' mission. This decision has continued to be an important part of my spiritual life.

Why should we give to the church? It goes back to what Paul tells us: By giving to Jesus' mission, we change the world. By giving to Jesus' mission, we change ourselves.

The church office will be closed Thursday and Friday, Nov. 26-27 in observance of the Thanksgiving holiday.






